


The Advisory Committee on Supply Chain Competitiveness

The Department of Commerce established ACSCC in 2011 to ensure that U.S. supply chain infrastructure fosters American economic competitiveness and export growth; re-chartered through Nov. 2017. The ACSCC represents the first time that America’s businesses and the Federal Government came together in a whole-of-government way to identify the biggest issues that impact our supply chain competitiveness and to provide the Secretary with proposed solutions. Permit Speed/Reform Ad-Hoc Subcommittee: Created in 2015 to urge the Administration to expedite implementation of action items mentioned in Fixing America’s Surface Transportation Act (FAST). Recommended establishing an interagency council; establishing timetable for issuing permit decisions; consider designating lead federal agency to coordinate responsibilities among multiple agencies
